# Do Your Taxes With Finesse

From the first moment you picked up a camera you knew photography was what you wanted to do with your life. Whether you take head shots, pictures for weddings, sporting events, and journalistic pursuits or whether your photos are artistic in nature; it's easy to get in over your head when tax time roles around. With some education, careful planning and organization you can keep your head above water and make sure that come tax time you don't find your tax situation over exposed and your tax savings undeveloped.

- Learn how to stay organized (bookkeeping, filing systems, etc.)
- Contribute to deductible retirement plans (401K or SEP)
- Make quarterly tax payments also known as "Estimated Payments"
- Carefully plan large automobile or equipment purchases to maximize the tax benefits
- Maintain a studio in your home as a "home office"
- Incorporate your business
- Re-structure health insurance and medical costs as business expenses
